The Duomo

One of the best things you can do in Milan is to go up to the roof of the Duomo. The view is fantastic - on a clear day you can see the Italian Alps. You can get the lift, or if you are feeling energetic, you can walk up the 250 steps. It is free to go in, but you must dress appropriately.
