

**Place clauses**

They are introduced by subordinating conjunctions like “where” and “wherever”. These clauses are used to talk about the location or position of something/ someone.

**Uses:**

- “Where” is used in place clauses to talk about the place or position in which someone or something is:

He was happy where he was.

- “Wherever” means “it doesn’t matter where”:

Wherever you go, I’ll go with you.

**Word order:** a place clause always goes after the main clause (final position):

subject + main verb .../ subordinating conjunction + subject + verb ...:

He was happy where he was.

However, in stories, the place clause can be put first:

subordinating conjunction + subject + verb ..., / subject + main verb ...:

Where Kate had stood last night, he now stood.
